

"On entering the Austro-Hugarian territory I declare in the name of the great Emperor that Russia, which has shed its blood many times for the emancipation of nations from the foreign yoke, only seeks the rehabiliation of rights and justice. Russia also brings liberty and the realization of your national vows. For many centuries the Austro-Hungarian Government planted among you discord and enmity. For it knew that as a result of this strife its dominion over you would continue.

"On the contrary, my sole aim is that each and every one of you may grow and prosper and keep at the same time the precious inheritance of language and faith of your fathers. Let every one of you, united to his brothers, live in peace and harmony with your neighbors, respecting their national rights."


