PHYSICIANS OF CITY HONORED BY SOCIETY

Doctors Ellenberger and Culp Are Made Secretaries of Sections of the State Body

In addition to the election of Dr. John B. McAllister as president of the body, two other Harrisburgers were honored yesterday by the Medical Society of the State of Pennsylvania, in session at Pittsburgh. In the section of medicine, Dr. J. Wesley Ellenberger, 324 North Third street, was elected secretary. Members of the section on eyes, ears, nose and throat diseases elected Dr. John F. Culp, 211 Locust street, as their secretary.

Philadelphia was selected as the place for next year's meeting. Dr. John B. McAllister, of Harrisburg, who was chosen head of the Medical Society of Pennsylvania, received many congratulations by wire and mail. In Harrisburg expressions of approval are heard throughout medical circles on the election of Dr. McAllister. Other officers elected followed:

First vice-president, Dr. J. F. Bell, Newberry; second vice-president, Dr. W. S. Stewart, Wilkes-Barre; third vice-president, Dr. J. R. Lahan, Mountville; fourth vice-president, Dr. Robert D. Eugene R. Whitmore, C. L. Stevens, Athens, assistant secretary, Dr. W. H. Cameron, Pittsburgh; treasurer, Dr. G. W. Wagoner, Johnstown; trustees, Dr. W. T. Sharples, West Chester; Dr. F. L. Van Sickle, Scranton, and Dr. A. F. Hull, Montomery.

The section on medicine after the election of officers, heard a paper read by Major Eugene D. C. Major Whitmore declared that through the introduction of vaccination as a preventive of smallpox, he had been stamped out in the army. He said that of 572 soldiers and officers, scattered over the possessions of the United States, there were no cases reported. He stated that no cases have been reported among the soldiers at Vera Cruz. Typhoid vaccination is more effective than smallpox vaccination, declared Major Whitmore.
