SENIORITY RULES ARE NOT POPULAR

Engineers and Firemen Will Vote on Change; Harrisburg Men Not Treated Fairly

Engineers on the Middle Division, of the Pennsylvania Railroad, within the next two weeks will decide by ballot their intentions as to future seniority rules. It is proposed to change the present system of promoting firemen and engineers. According to rules now in force Harrisburg employees get the short end in promotions. Under the present system, an engineer's seniority dates from the time he made an engineer. Harrisburg employees want this rule changed to provide that his term of service starts from the time of his appointment as a fireman. During the past few years firemen on the Altoona side of the division have been promoted and made engineers more rapidly than those on the Harrisburg side. Their rights to the

preference runs dated from the time they became engineers. As an example, Jones hires as a fireman at Harrisburg and three years later, Smith hires as a fireman at Altoona. Smith works five years and is made an engineer, but Jones is not made an engineer until two years later. Smith has two years' more service as an engineer than Jones and, therefore, gets the pick of runs ahead of Jones, while Jones has worked as fireman and engineer three years longer than Smith. Because they have been favored, it is said, Altoona men will oppose the change, as the rules affect every engineer and fireman at the division. A vote will be taken to decide what changes will be made.
