RAILROAD COACHES

'CLASS REPAIRS' OF P. N. R. SYSTEM Work Will Be Assigned to Harrisburg and Other Shops; Steel Coaches First

'Class repairs' start on the Pennsylvania Railroad system to-day. This means that every passenger, baggage and express car now in service will be given an overhauling. It is Fall and winter job. Cars will be run on sidings at all terminals. They will be scrubbed, repainted, seats upholstered and repairs made to lamps, bell ropes, etc.

The steel coaches will be the first to receive attention and the wooden passenger coaches will be put in the shops after the steel cars have been disposed of. It is expected to have the steel equipment all out of the shops by the middle of March.

Of the steel cars, there are 1,765 of the lines that will be sent to the shops for class repairs. A schedule has been prepared by the general offices in Philadelphia, dividing up the time among the various shops and setting forth the amount of work and time each will be given. Harrisburg shops will be included in the assignments.

The wooden baggage and express cars are said to be in bad condition, and there are 540 of these on the eastern lines to go to the shops.

August Earnings Less—Pennsylvania Railroad management were so effective in August that they converted a decrease of \$2,541,103 in the system's gross earnings for the month, compared with those of August, 1913, into a net gain of \$234,899 in net income. This is shown in the monthly statement.

In July there was a decrease of \$388,206. The gross earnings of the system in July were \$3,985,303 less than in July, 1913.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company's railway operating revenues in August were \$17,411,206, a decrease of \$1,909,222, but the net revenue from railway operations, \$5,253,923, was an increase of \$352,889, and the railway operating income of \$4,600,454, an increase of \$274,064.

Baltimore and Washington Railway's operating income was \$330,223, an increase of \$55,249; its gross earnings increased \$21,043.
