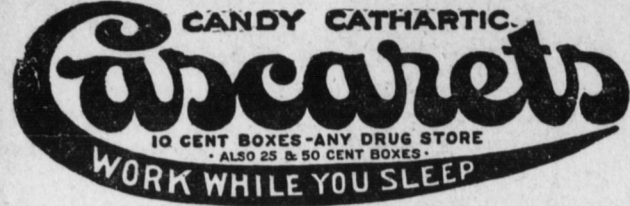

MURPHY INQUIRY IS TO BE SUBMITTED TO COUNCIL IN WRITING

By 3 to 2 Vote Commissioners Override Police Objection as to Rite Hearing

After repeated appeals to Mayor John K. Royal for fair play for Patrolman Andrew E. Murphy, City Council this afternoon decided by a vote of 3 to 2 to postpone action for another week on the Murphy dismissal recommendation until Mayor Royal, submitted in writing the results of his investigation into charges of drunkenness and insubordination.

The votes were Commissioners Bowman, Lynch and Taylor against Mayor Royal and Commissioner Gorgas.

Commissioner Lynch offered an ordinance providing for new sewers in Sixteenth, Paxton to Dock, Dock Sixteenth to Seventeenth, and Seventeenth from 125 feet west of Manada to Manada.

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
