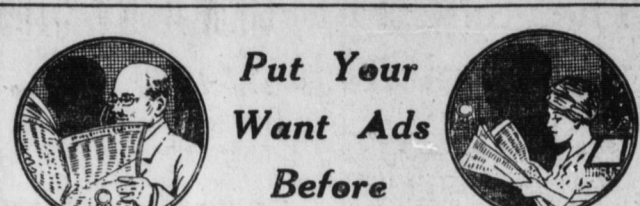

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ARREST MAN ON CHARGES OF ARSON

Think They Have Man Who is Responsible For Blazes Near Middletown

In the arrest of Ward Sheetz, aged 20 years, of Middletown, last night it is the belief of State Fire Patrolman Linnaus Heagy, of Middletown, that he has solved the mystery surrounding recent fires on the Redsecker farm near Middletown. Sheetz was arrested on the farm late last night, with shavings and other combustible material in his possession. A hearing was held this afternoon before Alderman William Kennard, at Middletown.

On Sunday night the barn on the Redsecker farm near Middletown was gutted. The damage to the property was estimated at \$10,000. Late yesterday afternoon the fire on the house on the farm was put out. The damage to the property was estimated at \$1,000. Linnaus Heagy of the Rescue Company, State fire patrolman, started an investigation. Last night about 10 o'clock he caught Sheetz coming from the woodshed near the house.

Sheetz had in his arms a bundle of shavings, some paper partly burned, and a box of matches in his pockets. Sheetz denied that he had a hand in the previous fires, and said he was going to start a fire near the river. Later it was learned that Sheetz was seen about the farm on Sunday.

The farm on which the fires occurred is located west of Middletown, near the pike. It was formerly a part of the Redsecker Young estate and is now owned by the Harrisburg Trust Company. The loss is partially covered by insurance.
