Hope Members Named on a State Committee

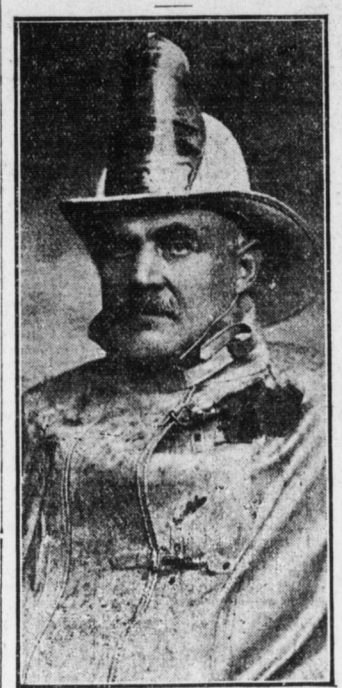

Scranton Fire Chief Urges Important Bill

One of the important bills to come before the Legislature next year endorsed by the State Association of Pennsylvania, will be an act giving county commissioners the right to purchase fire apparatus.

Legislation along this line was recommended by Fire Chief H. F. Ferber of Scranton, in a paper read before the convention. Fire Chief Ferber referred to the destructive forest fires which occur in many districts each year, and said in part:

The Hague, 6 A. M., via London, Oct. 9, 8 A. M. — The bombardment of Antwerp's inner forts and the outlying parts of the city started at 12:30 Thursday morning. At noon the city was burning in four places. It is reported that inner forts Nos. 4 and 5 have been silenced.

London, Oct. 9, 3:20 A. M. — Telegraphing from Ostend, the Daily Express correspondent sends the following: "The German plan for the reduction of Antwerp has carefully developed for many weeks past. The serious bombardment will only be begun when, in the opinion of the commandant, he is in a position to take the city with little delay."

M. — At the opening of the Federal Parliament to-day, the Government announced that Parliament would be invited to make Belgium a free gift of half a million dollars in recognition of her sacrifices.

Trolley schedules were also disrupted early in the evening. Schedules were abandoned and cars were run whenever it was possible to get one through the streets, which in the central section were packed from curb to curb with a good-natured jostling crowd. Regular schedules were resumed on the railroad and trolley lines this morning.

London, Oct. 9, 10:08 A. M. — A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Athens says it is asserted that German officers have placed some forty-two centimeter guns in the forts in the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus. Copenhagen, via London, Oct. 9, 6:55 A. M. — A German fishing vessel has been blown up by a German mine in the Langeland belt, north of the coast of Denmark. The captain was killed, but the rest of the crew were saved.

Rome, via London, Oct. 9, 7:20 A. M. — The Tribune says it has received information that the garrison of Fraxenval has surrendered to the Russians. The Russian Embassy, however, denies this report and declares that the investment of the fortress continues.

By Associated Press London, Oct. 9, 5:30 P. M. — The Evening Star's Antwerp correspondent, telegraphing by way of Amsterdam, says that eye-witnesses of the Zeppelin flights over Antwerp insist that they saw one such craft hit by shells from the forts and fall to the earth.

London, Oct. 9, 1:15 A. M. — A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Ostend, dated Thursday, says: "The Germans have occupied the southeast semi-circle of the third fortified line of Antwerp. The Belgians have made several sorties on the left bank of the Scheldt." New York, Oct. 9, — Among the 1477 passengers who arrived on the Lusitania from Liverpool to-day were Henry Brockdenck, Assistant Secretary of War, and twenty officers of the United States army who went to Europe shortly after the outbreak of hostilities on the cruiser Tennessee to assist Americans out of the war zone.
