### Austrians Claim to Have Stopped Russians

Vienna, Oct. 8, via Amsterdam and London, Oct. 9, 11.20 a. m.—An official announcement, signed by General Hofer, deputy chief of the general staff, was given out at Vienna to-day: "Our troops have made further advances and yesterday they repulsed the enemy on the road to Przemysl, near Barycz, west of Dnyow. Przemysl has been recaptured and guns have been taken. "In the territory between the river Vistula and the river San we took many prisoners from the fleeing Russians. "The renewed violent attacks on Przemysl have been splendidly repulsed and the enemy's dead and wounded were counted by the thousands. "We have had victorious battles at Sziget, in Marmaros county, Hungary, and in East Galicia. The landsturm and the Polish legionaries rivaled each other in gallantry."

### DIVIDE MEN'S WORK IN STOUGH CAMPAIGN
