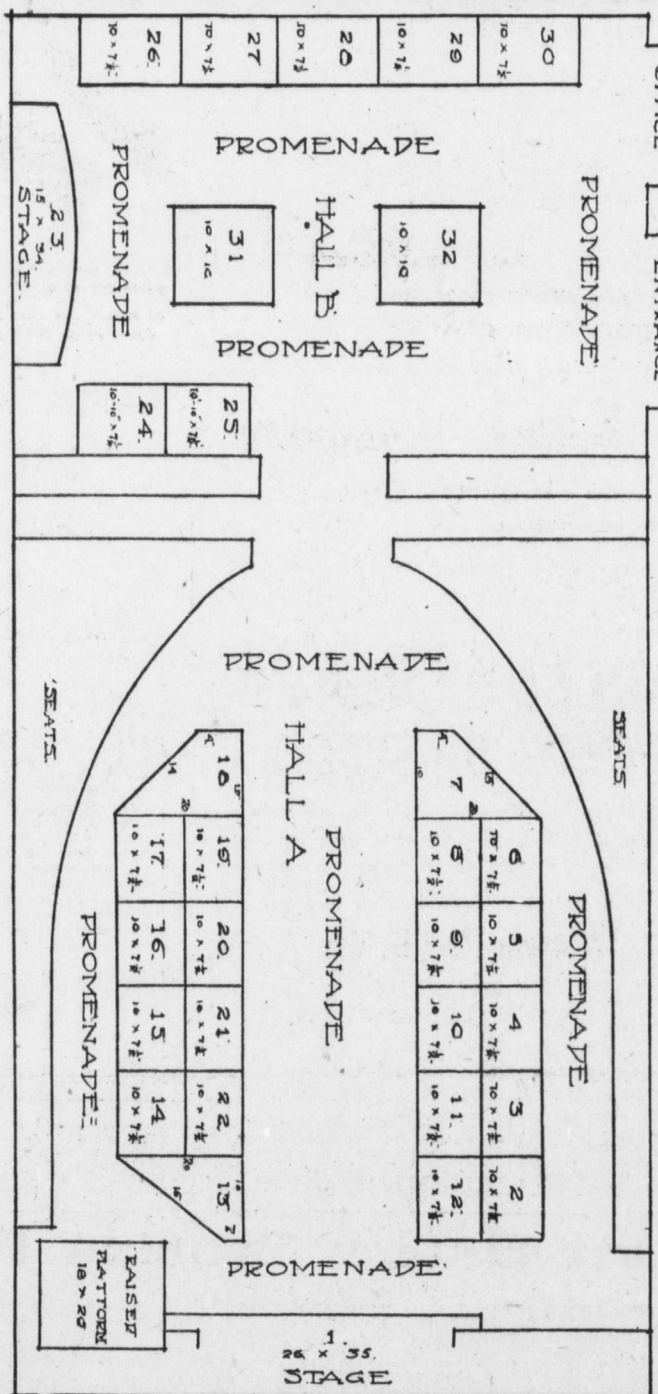

Suggests Class Organizations

The suggestion has been made by Professor Raine to several of the students that they get together and promote some sort of class organization. In the Philadelphia evening school the men have their own class organ-

izations, football, baseball team and debating teams. Banquets, smokers and other entertainments of like kind are given continually throughout the winter and in this way the students obtain social life and recreation and at the same time are getting a liberal business training.

Classes will continue without interruption, with the exception of Thanksgiving night, until December 17, when there will be a week's vacation for Christmas and New Year's.

There will be alternate lectures and quiz hours in each subject so that the student will be constantly kept in touch with the work. For the first week the entire four evenings will be devoted to lectures in order that there will be a basis for quiz work the following week.
