Paris, Oct. 12. — 3:15 P. M. — The following official communication was given out in Paris this afternoon:

"Third—On our right wing, in the Yosges, the enemy delivered a night attack in the region of Van de Sapt, to the north of St. Die; they were repulsed.

"In the Belgian Held—According to the latest information received here concerning the Eduation at Antwerp, the Germans occupy up to the present time the suburbs of this city. The twenty-four forts on the two banks of the River Escaut are resisting with energy.

"In Russia the fighting still continues."
