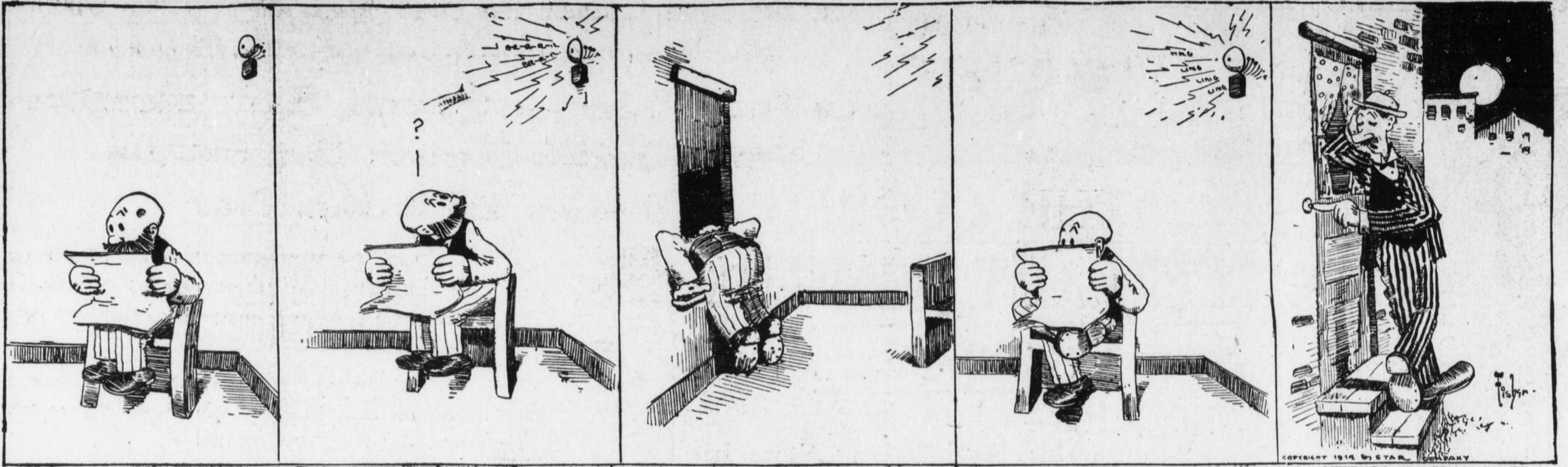

Lynn left home at 4 o'clock yesterday morning with his brother Guy and C. S. Parker. The young man got away from his partners and was stirring up a clump of bushes when the fox ran out. Lynn will receive \$2 bounty from the county.
