NEW RECORD MADE ON RIVER WALL

May Be Delay in Work Because of the Silt Removal Controversy

Another record in the construction of the concrete steps along the River Front was made yesterday by Henry Hoffman, of Newmarket, foreman in charge of the work in the neighborhood of the pumping station. Mr. Hoffman and his force completed sixteen steps, which breaks the one-day record on the job. He will have finished the steps to a point immediately in front of the pumping station by this evening, but unless filling material is provided for the space between that point and Forster street there is likely to be an interruption to the work in the most serious section of the wall.

There has been some controversy between the Board of Public Works and the contractors on the removal of the silt and other debris outside of the wall, and unless this is settled, further delay is almost certain to ensue. There is some question as to whether the wall will have settled sufficiently, and the theory is advanced that the high water of the winter would remove any question of settling hereafter. However, this is a matter that has not yet been definitely determined, and pending any further action, the contractors are puddling the space above the Walnut street bridge so as to be ready for the work. It was stated to-day that they are ready to go ahead when the engineers of the city reach a decision.

Will Not Remove Big Rocks

Having been advised by their counsel that they are not responsible for the removal of the big rocks scattered along the front of the wall and other debris of that character, the contractors say they will not do more than they believe they are required to do under the specifications. Board members of the Stucker Brothers firm declared to-day that they are removing and propose to continue to remove the formations along the wall for at least two feet below the base wall, and will abide by the advice of their counsel as to any controversy over removal of the remainder of the accumulations. This will make necessary some action by the Board of Public Works with a view to cleaning up the debris before the water rises.

Kalbfs Says Law Requires Tag on Arm

Dr. Joseph Kalbfus to-day issued a warning to all hunters that they must display hunters' license tags and that men who hunt with receipts only will be into trouble. He says that the law in the greatest protection of the farmer has against careless hunters who may tramp down the fields and serve as a means of identification.

Dr. Kalbfus said: "When the bill requiring tags was being considered by the Legislature, representatives of the game in this State, Mr. Cressy, Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor, and many others interested in agricultural pursuits, demanded of those pushing this measure that a particular feature of the bill should be the wearing of a tag by those engaged in hunting. * * * The farming interests of this State gave this bill their endorsement because of the acceptance of the commission to enforce the law requiring display of the tag, and that attention has been called to it time and time again. He closes his statement by saying that he is perfectly willing to have the matter tested in the courts and believes that the farmers of the State will strenuously oppose the effort to cramp sentiment for repeal of the clause requiring display of the tag."
