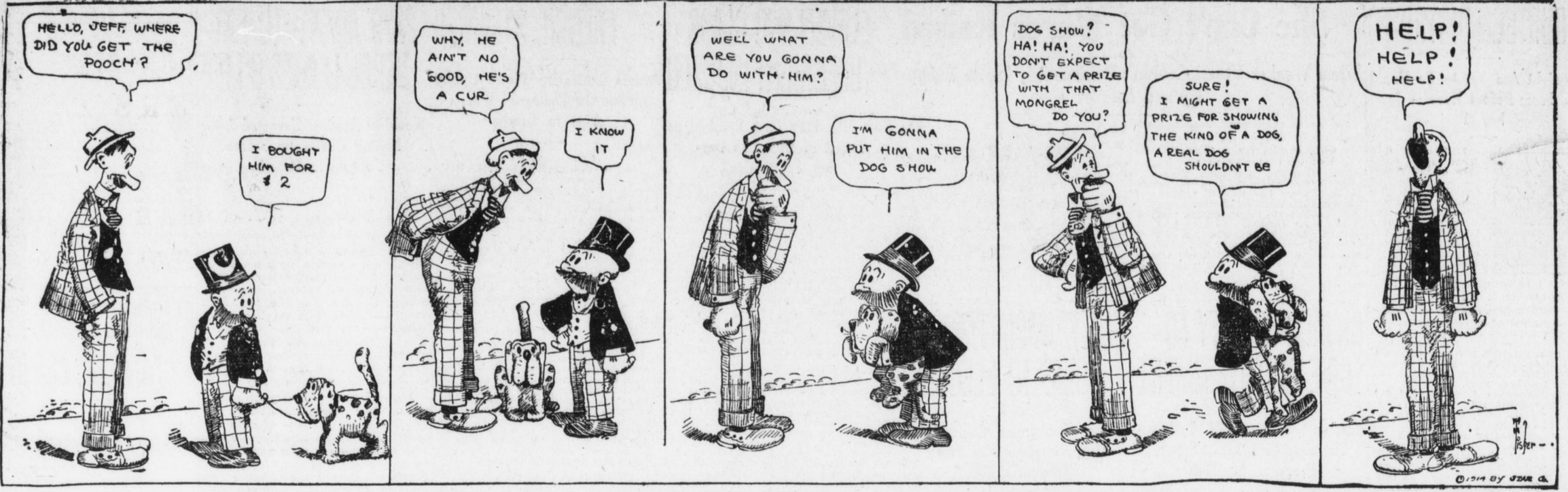

Southern Town of St. Petersburg Has Up-to-date Equipment; Athletics to Go South

Philadelphia, Oct. 27.—If present plans do not miscarry, the Phillies will do their Spring training in Florida next year, arrangements having been almost perfected to take the squad to St. Petersburg.

This will be the farthest South the Phillies have ever gone to get into condition, but the success attending other teams that went to Florida induced President Baker to favor the location.

St. Petersburg, on the west coast of Florida, is generally considered an ideal place for a ball team to train, not alone because of the climate, but because it is one of the few Southern camps with up-to-date equipment.
