B. & O., Too, Is Hauling an Average of Twenty-five Cars of Fruit a Day

As an indication of the amount of freight now being hauled from Berkeley and adjoining counties by the B. & O. and the C. V. railroads, it is officially stated that the C. V. several days ago hauled through Martinsburg the biggest single train of apples that ever went from that section. This train was made up of fifty-five big box cars, containing an average of 155 barrels to the car, or a total of about 9,075 barrels in the train. The apples were gathered up at the different shipping points between Winchester and Martinsburg and were destined for both eastern and southern points.

The B. & O. is hauling an average of twenty-five cars of apples a day at this time, with a prospect of heavier shipments from now until the close of the apple season in this section.

Pennsy Bringing East Horses For the War

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company is arranging with farmers adjacent to Columbia to shelter and feed 5,000 horses for two weeks and perhaps longer.

These horses were purchased in the West by agents of the allied armies for export to Europe for use in the war. As there will be no sailings from Philadelphia or New York for two weeks or a month, it will be necessary to care for the horses, and Columbia was selected as the place, as it is near the seaboard.
