Daughter of Council's ex-President to Get \$10 Award in Contest

Safety First committee of the Philadelphia division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, it is said, have found a new "smoke nuisance," the use of cigars, pipes and cigarettes during office and working hours. The committee realizes that it is going to be a task to abolish this branch of "smoke nuisance," without depriving some employees of a privilege long enjoyed.

In the opinion of the local committee, the "two-for-one" "makins," "plug," and other forms in which the God of Nicotine is worshipped, ought to be placed under the ban. Especially should this lid be on in departments patronized by the public and where close attention to business is a big factor.

No orders have yet been recommended by the committee, nor has this question been taken up officially. Some members of the committee and many officials are of the opinion that a man using tobacco while at work renders himself inefficient and that time lost in "lighting up" and "filling up" in a year's time, is a big loss to the company.

An order is issued, it will probably include all employes of ticket offices, freight offices, in hallways of office buildings, and in departments where carelessly thrown cigarette or cigar stumps, or waste basket, may cause considerable damage. It is said that at the next conference between department heads and committees, this question will come up for a general discussion, and definite action.
