

WENT DOWN IN 20 MINUTES

Boilers Exploded Just Before Destroyer Went Below Sur-

Deal, Eng., via London, Nov. 12, v 2.30 a. m.—Thousands of people witnessed the sinking off Deal of the British torpedo gunboat Niger by a German submarine while lying in the

At noon a loud roar of an explosion was heard, dense columns of black smoke were seen to arise and the Niger almost immediately began to
