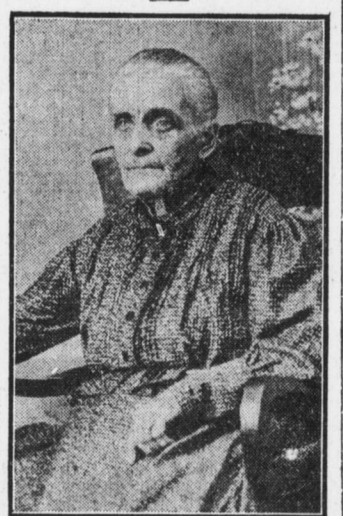
TEA IS FOLLOWED BY DINNER DANCE
