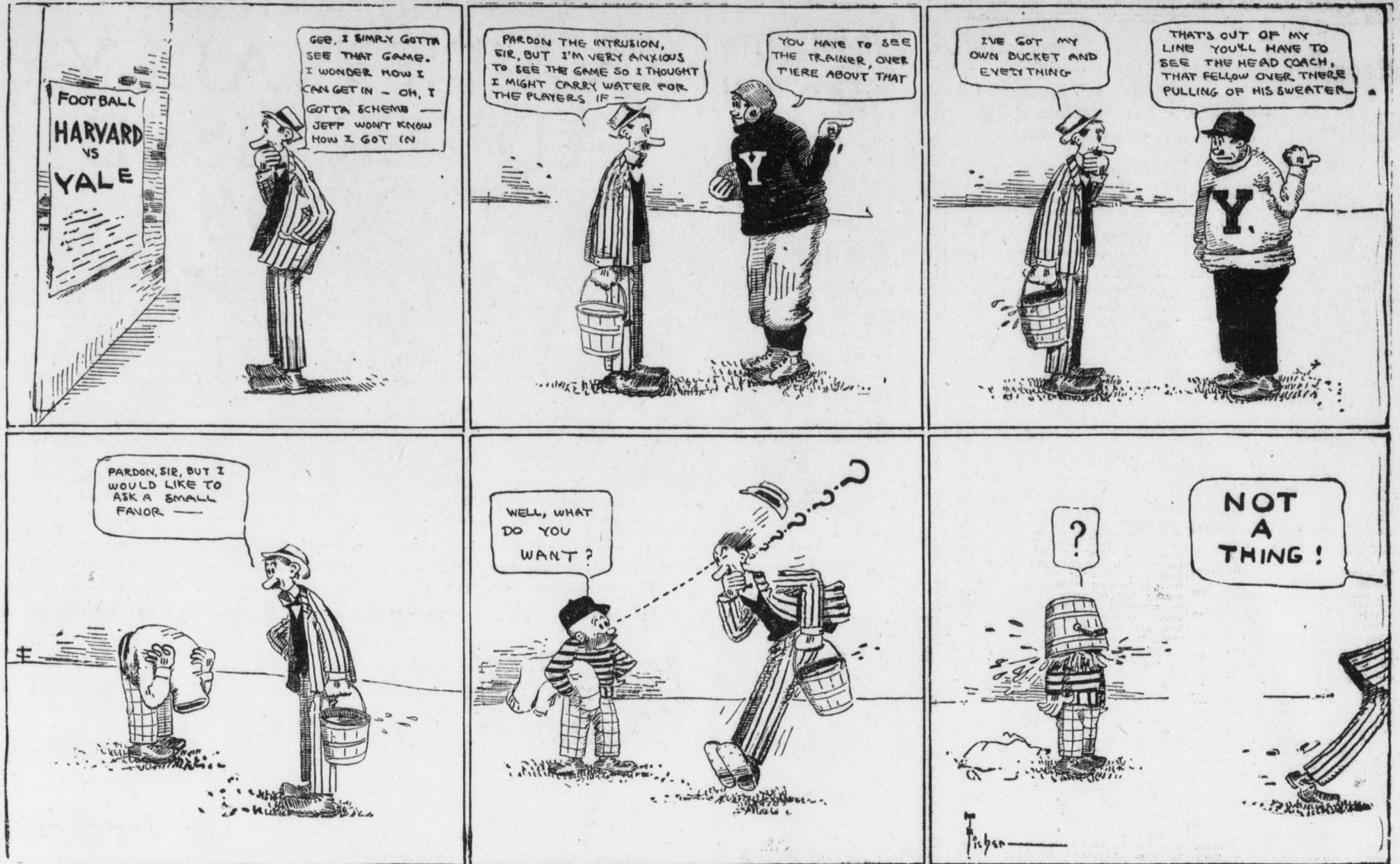
LEBANON VALLEY RESERVES
