MORE PROFESSIONAL WOMEN

Proportion of Men Decrease, According to Census Reports

Washington, D. C., Dec. 1.—Half a million more persons over 10 years of age were engaged in professional pursuits in the United States in 1910 than in 1900, according to figures to-day by the Census Bureau. In 1910 the number was 1,825,127, compared with 1,258,538 in 1900.

Of those engaged in profession occupations in 1910 1,511,709 were males and 673,418 females. During the decade the proportion of males decreased in the professions from 65.8 to 63.1 per cent., while that of females increased from 34.2 to 36.9 per cent.
