Berlin, Dec. 2.—By wireless to London, 3.00 P. M.—The German official statement issued to-day claims the capture of a strong French position in the Argonne forest by Emperor William's own regiment. The text of the communication reads:

"In the western theater of the war the enemy made insignificant advances which were checked.
"In the forest of Argonne a strong point of support of the enemy was taken by the Wurtemberg infantry regiment number 120, his majesty, the Kaiser's, own regiment. On this occasion two officers and about 300 of the enemy's troops were made prisoners.
