REAR ADMIRAL VICTOR BLUE

Washington, D. C., Dec. —Considerable comment is being made on the annual report of Rear Admiral Victor Blue, chief of the Bureau of Navigation, made public by Secretary, of the Navy Daniels. Citing the Mexican situation as an instance that strongly Illustrates the shortage of officers and men in the navy, he declared that the situation, if not so serious, would be ludicrous. The Mexican crisis created an emergency which made great demands upon the commissioned personnel. It particularly Illustrated the shortage of men compared with the number of ships we possess, said the report. Practically all officers on ships in Mexican waters, with the exception of heads of departments, were in the grade of ensign, and almost half of the heads of Jepartments were lieutenants.
