Great Northern Will Mine Its Own Michigan Properties Special to The Telegraph Duluth, Minn., Dec. 8.—Relations between Great Northern Ore Company and the United States Steel Corporation will end January 1, 1915, it was announced to-day. The Great Northern Company will operate its own ore properties, which have estimated deposits of 200,000,000 to 300,000,000 tons.

The Great Northern ore properties have been and passing through here Corporation, since 1907. All are on the Mesaba range, in Minnesota.

GRAIN MOVEMENT EAST IS LARGEST FOR FIVE YEARS Special to The Telegraph Chicago, Dec. 8.—From the traffic originating and passing through here Eastern railroads are doing a large business. A larger volume of flour, grain and provisions went East by rail last week than for the same time in more than five years. Flour increased 75,000 barrels over last week and \$1,000 barrels over last year; grain 1,212,000 and 2,987,000 bushels; provisions, 483 tons over last week and 484 tons over last year.

BUMPER CROP OF WHEAT TO BOOM ARGENTINE MARKETS Philadelphia, Dec. 8.—Argentina is harvesting the most abundant wheat crop in her history. A dispatch received here yesterday places the exportable surplus of the crop at 140,000,000 bushels. In anticipation of the vastly increased resources of the country through the unusually large crop the government has authorized the Empresa del Ferrocarril del Sud, contractors of Buenos Aires, to construct important irrigation works in the valleys of the Negro and Neuquen Rivers, to build two canals for the Rio Negro Superior system.

13,066,105 BALES GINNED By Associated Press Washington, Dec. 8.—Cotton ginned prior to December 1 amounted to 13,066,105 bales, the Census Bureau announced to-day. Round bales included 36,195. Sea Island 62,991 bales.

GREY PERISHES WHEN SHIP STRIKES WINE 37 Men on Swedish Steamer Reported Lost Off Finnish Coast

London, Dec. 8, 5:10 A. M.—A dispatch from Stockholm reports that the entire crew of thirty-seven men of the Swedish steamer Norra Sverige perished when the ship struck a mine off the Finnish coast. Two Swedish steamers, the Luna and the Everilda, carrying 1,200 students, were having been lost in a similar manner.

DIRECTORS DEADLOCK ON CHOICE OF HEAD

Ballot 78 Times and Finally Postpone Election Until Saturday Night

After voting again and again until seventy-eight ballots had been taken, the School Board yesterday afternoon quit because of darkness and postponed until Saturday at 7:30 o'clock, the election of a president to succeed Harry A. Boyer, after the session lasted more than two hours.

In the end there are three candidates in the field with five votes necessary to a choice. The list stands thus: Harry A. Boyer—4.

Adam D. Houtz—1.

The Rev. Dr. William N. Yates—2.

Harry A. Bretz, the retiring vice-president and candidate for the same honors again, served as chairman. The ball opened with three candidates in the field—residents in the A. Boyer, Adam D. Houtz and the Rev. Dr. William N. Yates. Messrs. Saul, Kennedy, Fohl, and Bell voted for Mr. Boyer; Messrs. Yates, Werner and Boyer voted for Mr. Houtz, and Messrs. Bretz and Houtz voted for Dr. Yates. Dr. Yates hadn't been mentioned as a candidate, but Messrs. Houtz and Bretz just cast their votes for him from the start.

On the fifty-fifth ballot Mr. Werner switched his vote to Dr. Yates in an effort to break the deadlock, but this failed and he turned back again to Mr. Houtz after ten unsuccessful attempts. When five ballots had been taken Mr. Houtz suggested that the election go over until Saturday, but there were unanimous objections to this and the voting went smoothly along. A little later one of the directors sent out for cigars to while the hours and the voting was resumed. Then the clerks were told to phone home to anxious wives and little ones that their father wouldn't likely be home to supper and that mother and the children shouldn't wait.
