

Hinkletown.—Miss Carrie V. Erb, of this place, was married yesterday to Andrew H. Garber, of Lancaster, the ceremony being performed at the home of the bride by the Rev. M. W. Schweitzer, of Ephrata.

Mt. Carmel.—After living three days with a broken neck sustained when he fell out of bed when asleep, George Stozza, Midway, near here, died in the State Hospital, at Fountain Springs.

Reading.—Anthony Schleich, prominent druggist, was arrested here yesterday on a warrant issued at the instance of Deputy State Factory Inspector Charles T. Milley, charged with violating the child labor laws, by permitting Edwin McDonough, 14 years old, to work after 9 p. m. Magistrate Kreider held the accused for a hearing.

ITALIAN MAY HAVE TO PAY DEATH PENALTY FOR CRIME

Special to The Telegraph Hagerstown, Md., Dec. 15.—Dominec Gallardaccio, an Italian, was arrested here on the charge of assaulting James Sabatino, a 6-year-old girl, the daughter of Vincenzo Sabatino, and at a hearing before Justice D. W. Doub he was held for the action of the next grand jury of the circuit court without bail. The testimony heard at the hearing was of the most revolting character.

Dr. J. Royer Laughlin stated that the condition of the child is serious and that she would either be a cripple for life or possibly die from the effects of her alleged ill treatment. Gallardaccio had been employed on the State road at Middletown and is in bad health. The extreme penalty for the crime with which he is charged is death.

CHILD FOUND DEAD IN CRIB
