

Police Searching Ruins of Apartment House For

Cleveland, Ohlo, Dec. 15. — Police and firemen to-day were searching the ruins of a two-story brick apartment house in Madison avenue which was wrecked last night as a result of a gas explosion, for the bodies of three jersons supposed to be buried in the debris. The bodies of seven dead have been recovered and nine persons who were more or less injured are in hospitals. Physicians said to-day that the injured probably will recover.

The fact that the explosion occurred in a foreign settlement and that those injured speak very little English made it difficult to establish the dendity of the victims and to determine whether any more were missing. Some of the firemen and police expressed belief that the death toll would not exceed nine.


