

Under the glass, above the pron itself, is a printed slip, yellowed with age. It looks as if it were a proof lip from a job office, set up and printed for the purpose. It reads:

"Masonic Apron.

"Owned and worn by General George Washington in the Masonic Custom of the original owner's death in 1792, of the original owner's death
