Declare Railroads Are Trying to Create False Impression on Public Mind

Members of the State Legislative Board of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, gave notice to-day that they will make a vigorous fight against any effort to repeal the full crew law. Pre-vious to adjournment the following resolution on this question was unani-mously adopted:

Whereas, The men employed in train service in the State of Pennsylvania, in order to propery safeguard their own lives and the lives of the traveling public, by supporting the enactment of a full crew law; and,
Whereas, The railroad companies operating within the State, complaining of the increased operating cost under the law, regardless of the increased safety surrounding the movements of their trains, have

the full crew law repealed at the coming session of the Legislature; and, ... Whereas. It appears to be the purpose of the railroad companies to create sentiment against this law by misrepresenting its application, by wilfully substituting the title of the extra crew law instead of full crew law; and, ... Whereas. This is unfair to the men in train service and also to the public because it leads them to believe that the law requires the railroad companies to place an extra crew on all trains; and. ...
