

CATTLE DISEASE PROVING COSTLY

Reports to State Livestock Board Show That It Is Five Times Worse Than 1908

Officers of the State Livestock Sanitary Board say that, judging from reports in hand, the outbreak of the foot and mouth disease among cattle in this State in 1914 will be five times more serious than the outbreak in 1908.

Salmon Season Closing.—The season for catching salmon and pickerel in Pennsylvania will close with the year and the cold weather is reported to have permitted some excellent fishing.

Giving Data.—Reports on over 50,000 accidents collected by the State's Bureau of Statistics have been placed at the disposal of the Pennsylvania Industrial Accidents Commission.

What "Year" Changed.—Among the suggestions for legislation which have been received at the State Capitol have been some to make the period for which corporations make their reports to the State coincide with the calendar year.

Autos Yield Income.—Almost a quarter of a million dollars has been reported to the State Highway Department for 1915 automobile registrations.

Palmer Honored.—Lew R. Palmer, chief inspector of the State Department of Labor and Industry, has been presented with a medal by the American Museum of Safety in recognition of his work for safety in industries and everyday life.

To Discuss Code.—The State Industrial Board has arranged for a general conference of the committee named to draft standards of safety and sanitation for its members.

Studying Our Prisons.—Henry Smith Thompson, of Beacon, Mich., a representative of the Governor of Michigan, today began a study of the penitentiaries of the State and their methods of management.
