Discusses Request for Warships to Preserve Neutrality of United States

By Associated Press New York, Dec. 23.—The request made by Colonel George W. Goethals, Governor of the Canal Zone, for the dispatch of American warships to the canal to preserve the neutrality of the United States, was made at the request of naval officers in charge of witness plants and naval affairs in the zone; it was forwarded to Washington as a matter of form by Colonel Goethals, acting in his capacity as Governor of the Canal Zone, and the incident is ended so far as Colonel Goethals is concerned—so announced the Colonel himself upon his arrival here to-day from Cristobal on the steamship Panama.
