

UNIQUE DEVICE ON CABILLAC CARBURETOR

CADILLAC CARBURETOR

Ingenious Arrangement Supplies Extra Gasoline For Quick Acceleration
One of the interesting features in connection with the development of the eight-cylinder motor by the Cadillac Motor Car Company has been the correction of a fault comomn to practically all, if not all carburetors.

Ofttimes there is the lack of ability on the part of the carburetor to respond freely and fully to a sudden and complete opening of the throttle. When the throttle is quickly opened, the gasoline, flowing through the spray nozzle, does not at once pass in sufficient quantity to form, with the inrushing air, a gas of the required explosive quality. This disproportion of gasoline and air is of hardly more than momentary duration, but while it exists the motor frequently misfires and cannot develop the power necessary to rapid acceleration of the speed of the car.

The device which the Cadillac engineers have evolved to obviate the condition just described is an ingenious

gineers have evolved to obviate the condition just described is an ingenious application of the plunger pump principle, trough its action is confined to a single stroke of the plunger. When the driver suddenly opens his throttle, the plunger automatically forces an extra supply of gasoline through the spray nozzle, thereby providing a correct explosive mixture for quick acceleration.

OLD WOMAN WANDERS AWAY


Betty Taylor, Found With Feet in Stream at Carlisle.

Costs Saxon Owners Only \$38.60 to Cross Continent

\$38.60 to Cross Continent

A trip across the continent, attended by many exciting experiences, has just been completed in Los Angeles by G. W. and J. W. Logan, of Tiffin, Ohlo, who drove their Saxon car through to the coast in the face of the worst weather and road conditions of the year.

The entire expenditures by the Logans on their trip was \$38.60. This amount established a precedent in economy that will doubtless hold as a record for some time. No repairs of any kind were required along the road, and as the car was left in the open each night, the garage expense was a negligible quantity.

The first rough sledding occurred near Columbus, O., where the travelers met with the customary autumn rains. The old highway became a mud streak through Indiana, and across the prairies of Illinois the progress at times was almost impossible.

Entering Colorado, conditions reached a climax up to that time. In the mountains snow was from two to four feet deep, while at other points rain, slush and sleet were encountered, but the car ploughed through.

In Utah the worst roads and the most exciting incidents befell the pilgrims. Rain and light snows had turned the so-called roads into quagnires. Rivers and streams overflowed their banks, so that the Logans had to cross a number of them by bumping over the ties of railroad bridges.

The Logan brothers reached Los Angeles by way of a number of Nevada towns. They hold the record of being the first Saxon owners to cross the continent.
