ATTACK COAL TAX ACT

Argument was heard before the Dauphin county judges to-day on the test of the constitutionality of the anthracite coal tax act of 1913, which has been attacked in appeals from settlement of the tax by the Auditor General and State Treasurer. The companies appealing are the St. Clair, Plymouth and Aidan Coal Companies, operating in Schuylkill and Luzerne counties. The attorneys for the companies attacked the act in half a dozen points, including the phraseology, contending that it violated the taxation clause of the Constitution and that it sought to tax property which is out of the State. No decision will be given for some time.

QUARANTINE IS IN EFFECT TODAY

Livestock Sanitary Board Keeps Many Counties Still Under the Regulations

The quarantine which the State Livestock Sanitary Board adopted at its recent meeting went into effect in the State to-day and while the territory covered is very much reduced the State ban on movement of cattle except for immediate slaughter, for public sales and for sales and movements of hides, fodder and other things, remains in force. Only by means of permits may anything be done in the quarantine area.

Dr. C. J. Marshall, the State Veterinarian, has issued a statement showing how the rules may operate and how permits may be secured.

The quarantine area is as follows: The counties of Berks, Lancaster, Lebanon, Lehigh and York, and the townships of Berwick, Conowingo, Germany, Hamilton, Mt. Pleasant, Oxford, Reading and Union in Adams county; Braddock, Chartiers, Collier, Kennedy, Killbuck, O'Hara, Ohio, Penn, Reserve, Robinson, Ross, Shuler, Union and Wilkins in Allegheny county; South Beaver and Chippewa in Beaver county; Bucks, Lebanon, Lehigh, Plumstead, Richland, Solebury, Springfield, Hincium, Warrington and West Rockhill in Bucks county; East Penn and Mahoning in Carbon county; Birmingham, East Bradford, West Bradford, East Brandywine, West Brandywine, Caln, East Caln, West Caln, East Coventry, North Coventry, West Coventry, Elk, East Fallowfield, West Fallowfield, East Goshen, West Goshen, Highland, Honey
