The system as adopted is very simple, enabling any person to sound an alarm. The three main streets of the town, Herman, Hummel and Bosler, will be the dividing lines for making three sections of the town. When fire is discovered it is the duty of the person discovering the fire to go to the firehouse and sound the alarm number of the plug nearest the fire, thus enabling the firemen to know the exact location of the fire. The plugs will soon be numbered and a printed directory of the plug numbers and locations will be placed in all public buildings of the town.

Berlin, Jan. 7, by wireless to London, 3.10 P. M.—The German official communication on the progress of the war given out in Berlin this afternoon reports that further advances have been made by the Germans in the western part of the forest of Argonne and that desperate fighting is going on to the north of Arras.
