Complaints were made to Dr. J. M. J. Raunick, city health officer, to-day of the failure of the Pennsylvania Reduction Company to dump only clean ashes on the River Front above. "Hardscrabble."

Since yesterday ashes were being red as a sort of bottom "fill" for certain sections of the water front and the garbage company is required to station men at these points, whose duty it is to prevent any scattering of waste paper and to spread the ashes properly. High winds, however, have scatered the unsightly and unsunitary scraps until the lawns all along the street are littered with the refuse. Dr. Raunick said he would attend to the matter promptly. "This is the first complaint we've had about this matter," said he. "We'll see that it is rectified at once. I'll call there immediately and caution the men."

London, Jan. 8, 2.08 P. M.—Ambassador Page to-day received from the British government the preliminary reply to the American note protesting against the British interference with American shipping. He forwarded it immediately to Washington.

The time of delivery of the more definite supplementary reply which the British government is to make is uncertain. It probably will be within two weeks.

Further negotiations between the two governments concerning specific cases of detention of American vessels will precede the preparation of the final British answer.
