**PLAN MASS MEETING FOR IDLE EMPLOYEES**

**Railroad Men Hear Suggestions For Fighting "Full Crew" Law Repeal**

Plans for a mass meeting in the interest of the unemployed and to fight the repeal of the "full crew" law were discussed at a meeting of railroaders yesterday. The meeting was held in Fackler's Hall, Thirteenth and Derry streets, under the auspices of the Brotherhood of Federated Railway Employees. In attendance were 250 railroaders, the majority of whom were brotherhood men.

The meeting for the unemployed will be held January 21, probably at the Chestnut Street Auditorium. Governor Martin G. Brumbaugh will be invited to be present. It is also planned to ask the aid of President Woodrow Wilson and Governor Brumbaugh in getting employment for idle men.

On January 28 Fred Warren, editor of the Appeal the Reason, a Socialist paper, will lecture on "The Value of Publicity." The speakers at yesterday's meeting were W. H. Pierce, president of the Brotherhood of Federated Railway Employees, and C. Quinn, the secretary. A committee will have charge of the petitions opposing the repeal of the "full crew" law.

**Vote on Woman Suffrage to Be Taken Tomorrow**

Washington, D. C., Jan. 11.—Supporters of woman's suffrage and opponents alike were arriving here today from throughout the country in readiness for the battle which has been staged for the House to-morrow when a vote will be taken on the resolution and amendment making woman suffrage nation-wide. They will occupy seats in the visitors' gallery during the debates on the resolution.

**DEBATE ON APPROPRIATIONS**

Washington, D. C., Jan. 11.—The District of Columbia appropriation bill was again to-day up for consideration in the Senate and Democratic leaders were ready if opportunity presented to force a vote on the measure during the day. Republican leaders in the Senate who are opposing the ship purchasing bill are prepared to continue their attacks on the measure when it is called up for consideration.

**CORWIN TO SUCCEED CAMP**

New Haven, Conn., Jan. 11.—Professor Robert N. Corwin has been named as football representative on the University Athletic Association for the coming year, succeeding Walter Camp, according to announcement made at Yale to-day by Captain A. D. Wilson, of the football team. The retirement of Mr. Camp, it is explained, is in line with his desire to sever official connection with athletics and does not curtail his services as graduate advisory coach to football captains and coaches.

**BOARD WILL MEET**

On Wednesday evening the health bureau, food inspectors, city bacteriologist and other officers will meet and reorganize for the year. Full reports will be read showing the work done by the department during the past year.

Dr. George R. Moffitt, city bacteriologist, reports that from April 1 to December 31, 1914, 27 samples of milk were tested for bacteria and 465 chemically analyzed. Three hundred and one tests were made for diphtheria, and seventy-six Widal tests for typhoid fever suspects.
