EX-SUPERINTENDENT AND CLERK INDICTED

Federal Grand Jury Finds Bills Against Former Indian School Officials

Special to The Telegraph. Sunbury, Pa., Jan. 15.—In the United States Court here yesterday the grand jury found three true bills against S. J. Nori, ex-chief clerk, and Moses Freedman, ex-superintendent of the Carlisle Indian school. In one bill both are charged with destroying and burning public records. In a second four counts are found against each for embezzling public moneys, and in a third Freedman alone is indicted on the charge of embezzling receipts from the sale of tickets to athletic games. According to the first indictment the destroying and burning receipts for money, 20 in all, given by Nori for individual Indian student money accounts, which had been transferred by William H. Miller, financial clerk of the school, to Nori, as chief clerk, for use by Nori and Freedman in purchasing railroad transportation for students, the names of whom are known because of the destruction of these receipts.

The second indictment says it was their duty to take care of moneys belonging to the students until such time as they were needed for payment, among other things, of the expenses incurred by these students in traveling from their homes. The money is usually placed on deposit for these students to their credit, with the Farmers' Trust Company, of Carlisle, according to the indictment, subject to withdrawal by check by the individual student to whom it belongs, only upon the written approval of the superintendent and chief clerk.

FEWER HOURS AT SAME PAY

Hanover, Pa., Jan. 15.—Yesterday the Hanover Shoe Company announced that the working hours of its male employees is reduced from 57 1/2 to 54 hours per week, effective at once, without reducing the wage. About a year ago the hours of the female operatives were reduced from 57 1/2 to 50 hours, with the same pay. No persons under 16 years of age are employed.

REFUSES LIQUOR LICENSES

SCHLEISNER'S

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Says Commission Rule Tends Toward Oligarchy

Special to The Telegraph. Reading, Pa., Jan. 15.—Accusations that the present city council was not a representative body and that commission rule tended to degenerate government of the people into an oligarchy were contained in a statement made public here to-day by the Citizens' Committee, Walter S. Frees, former select councilman and prominent businessman, chairman.

The charges are an aftermath of the annexation of Cumru township, against which the committee fought, and which, it contends, was directly antagonistic to the wishes of the majority of the people. It is charged that the old system of government, with a councilman to each ward, was more representative than the present small body and less likely to antagonize public sentiment.

The Clark commission law, the statement avers, as it stands at present, with the initiative limited as to proposed legislation and the referendum virtually null and void on account of its restrictions and its cumbersome procedure, needs a home rule bill, drafted by the mayors of the third class cities, to take all power away from the citizen.

Nun Saved From Knife by Miracle, Friends Say

Scranton, Pa., Jan. 15.—Many Catholics of this city and the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary are firmly convinced that by a miracle alone was Sister Mary Celestine, superior of St. Joseph's Foundling Home, saved from a surgeon's knife a year and a half ago and cured of gangrene of the great toe, a condition physicians say calls for immediate amputation, and of diabetes as well. The physician in the case, Dr. John O'Malley, one of the leaders in his profession here, says the case is the most remarkable he has known. Sister Celestine says the rules of her community forbid her to talk of the miracle. Members of St. Joseph's Society say the miracle was wrought after a novena had been said by the six nuns. A surgeon advised immediate amputation if the patient's life was to be saved and a day was set, but the superior delayed the operation until the day the novena was to end. That morning she was better. She gained weight and strength and has been in good health ever since.
