



CROWDS COME DESPITE RAIN FOR INAUGURAL

CAPITAL READY FOR GOV. BRUMBAUGH

New Executive Arrives Tonight; Inauguration at Noon; Hotels Crowded

APPOINTMENT TALK IS HEARD AMONG MEMBERS

Special Trains From Many Cities; Many Political Clubs in Town

No Rain Tomorrow

The forecast of the local Weather Bureau for to-morrow is for a clear and bright day with no rain.

The State Capital is ready for the coming of the new Governor.

To-night shortly after 6.30 Dr. Martin G. Brumbaugh and members of his family will arrive from Philadelphia and will go direct to the executive mansion.

Weather conditions to-day have been atrocious, but the government bureau predicts that to-morrow will be cloudy and cold and that the temperature may go below the freezing point to-night.

The city's streets and buildings are gay with flags and bunting and hotels are already crowded.

Political clubs come to the inauguration and the members of the Legislature, which will resume its sessions to-night, are in the city, all speculating upon the appointments to be made and the policy of the new government.

If the weather conditions improve to-night the city will be jammed to-morrow. Special trains have been arranged on all of the railroads to bring crowds from as far away as Johnstown, Williamsport, Wilkes-Barre, Allentown and Philadelphia.

THE WEATHER

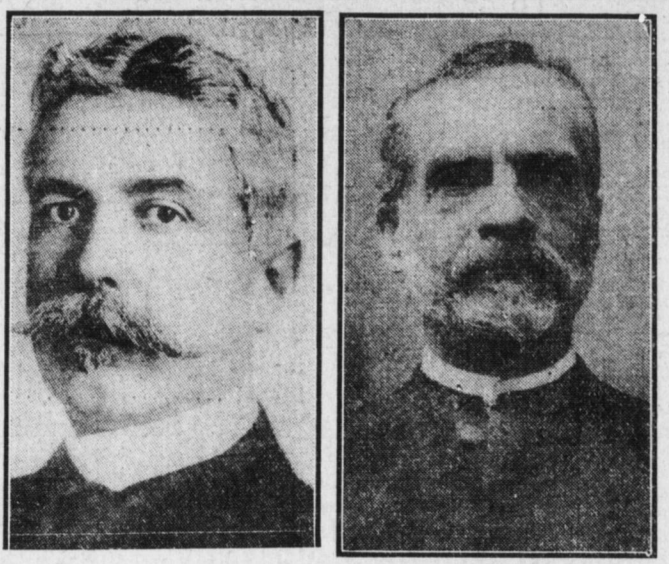
For Harrisburg and vicinity: Cloudy, probably rain and colder to-night, with lowest temperature about freezing; Tuesday, cloudy and colder.

UNIONTOWN NATIONAL BANK CLOSES DOORS

Has Capital of \$100,000 and Deposits of Approximately \$2,600,000

PAID 22 PER CENT. ANNUALLY

J. V. Thompson Is President of Defunct Organization; Directors in Session

Uniontown, Pa., Jan. 18.—The First National Bank of Uniontown, failed to open its doors this morning and waiting customers were told that the board of directors were in session and an announcement would soon be made.

The bank has a capital of \$100,000 and was on a dividend basis of 22 per cent. annually. J. V. Thompson is president.

A large crowd gathered in front of the bank, and a few minutes before noon a notice was posted on the door announcing that the institution was closed by order of the directors.

RESQUES CONTINUE IN EARTHQUAKE ZONE

Lieutenant-General Stoessel was famous as the commander of the Russian troops at Port Arthur during the Russo-Japanese War.

RUSSIAN FORCES HOLD GERMANS IN CHECK WEST OF POLAND'S CAPITAL

Advices From French Sources Say Allied Front, in Positions Taken After Retreat in East, Is Stronger Than Ever; Berlin Says Offensive Movement of Allies Has Broken Down; Russians Advance Toward Prussian Border

Detailed descriptions of the battle along the Aisne, supplementing the brief announcements of the French and German War offices, show that fighting raged in ferocity that which occurred along the Yser canal in Flanders, when the Germans attempted to break through the English Channel, although the number of men engaged was smaller.

Survivors Flee. Late reports from Petrograd emphasize the completeness of the victory said to have been gained over the Turkish troops.

In Poland the Germans have again attacked the Russians west of Warsaw, but apparently have been unable thus far to break through the line of defense.

PLAN TO INVADE PALESTINE

Six Husky Bulgars to Plunge Into River For Wooden Cross

Will Risk Lives Tomorrow During Religious Festival; Consul General Nicolo Parentoff Will Attend

Several thousand Bulgarians, Macedonians and Servians, members of the Greek Orthodox Church, will gather in Philadelphia to-morrow to celebrate Epiphany, or the festival commemorating the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan.

Part of the ceremonies includes the hurling of a large wooden cross far into the Susquehanna river by the Rev. Father Nicholo Pavloff, of the Bulgarian Orthodox Church, and its rescue from the water by several swimmers.
