Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 22.—Having just been elected president of the order of Anti-Polygamy Crusaders, Mrs. Frances J. Diefenderfer, of Erie, Pa., goes directly to Harrisburg to deliver an address on "Mormonism."

She will speak in the Y. W. C. A. at 3 p. m., on Wednesday, January 27, before the Civic Club.

Mrs. Diefenderfer is the best informed woman in America as to the present status of Polygamy, she is certain to command the greatest interest. In this work she has the support of the National Reform Association, the most powerful Christian organization in the world, outside of the church itself, and her associates are the Rev. Dr. James S.
