\$15,000 Worth of Fine Horses Sold at Ephrata Exchange Last Saturday

Ephrata, Pa., Jan. 23.—On Saturday last Will Leber sold at his sales and exchange stables in Ephrata four carloads of western horses as follows: Two carloads of Illinois horses, fifty-five head, at prices which averaged \$138 per head and aggregating \$7,590; three carloads of express car loads of thirty Kansas horses for R. Yoder at prices averaging \$147, the aggregate price for this load being \$4,132; one carload of twenty-three head of Kansas and Nebraska horses at prices which averaged \$141, or an aggregate of \$3,352.
