CAN'T MOVE WATER PIPE FROM BRIDGE

Hundreds of Residents of Lower End Petition County Commissioners in Vain

Middletown, Royalton, Hummelstown and Londonderry township residents to the number of several hundred signed a four-foot long petition to the Dauphin county commissioners to-day asking that the big 12-inch water main of the Middletown and Swatara Consolidated Water Company be removed from the bridge across the Swatara between Royalton and Middletown.

The main, according to the petitioners, interferes with the passage of pedestrians. The commissioners said the request would necessarily have to be refused although the board has tried repeatedly to have the main taken from the viaduct.

HALF BE RECOVERED

Attorney General's Last Report Shows That Much Money Is Due to the State

The State of Pennsylvania has a million dollars due to the maintenance of insane persons whose families or next of kin are sufficient to provide for their care and treatment in State hospitals.
