Modern electrically operated "trips" for the fire horses which will release the doors of the stalls and the doors of the firehouse automatically with the sounding of the alarm are to be provided for the new Royal firehouse. The "trips" are provided for in the specifications for the Royal's new home, plans for which were opened yesterday by Commissioner M. Harvey Taylor. Only two architects competed, and according to the terms of the competition they signed fictitious names to the plans. One signed no name, but merely drew a triangle to serve instead. The other signed the plans "Jack Axe."
