CHURCHILL PLACES FOND HOPES ON ENGLISH NAVY

Paris, Feb. 2, 5:20 A. M.—"For the first time in history England can say: 'The sea is free'" declared Winston Spencer Churchill, Great Britain's first lord of the admiralty, in an interview with Hughes Leroux, editor of the "Matin." "In the days when you and we fought each other," he continued, "our most important victories never brought us security comparable with that which we enjoy to-day. Even after that Trafalgar we knew nothing like it."

TURK DESERTERS SURRENDER

Cairo, via London, Feb. 2, 11:09 A. M.—Although there has been no further fighting in the Suez canal district a considerable number of Turkish deserters have surrendered. They have given graphic descriptions of the march from Jerusalem by way of Beerseba and El-Arish (near the boundary of Egypt and Palestine). They say they were provided only with a meager supply of provisions and were compelled to buy food at high prices from Bedouins.

GERMANS MOVING ON WARSAW

London, Feb. 2, 1 P. M.—The German lines, after a long period of preparation appear to-day, judging from reports reaching London, to be put into execution their plans for an advance on Warsaw. At the same time Austrians seem to have renewed their forward movement in the Carpathian mountains.

WILSON HAS NO PEACE PLANS

Washington, Feb. 2.—President Wilson said to-day that while he saw nothing definite toward the making of peace in Europe at the moment, there was a strong growing hope and sentiment of peace all over the world. The President was asked if there was anything definite in sight. He replied he was sorry to say there was not.

EARTHQUAKE LOWERS LEVEL OF LAKE PATERNO SIXTEEN FEET

Rome, Feb. 2, 7:40 A. M.—Earth disturbances of a minor nature continue at Avezzano, one of the most important cities in the Kingdom. Notwithstanding a heavy rain, the level of Lake Paterno by sixteen feet after a vortex had appeared in its center. This is indicative of the lowering of the level of the earth an immense volume of water from the lake.

AGREEMENT TO KEEP ITALY NEUTRAL DENIED IN LETTER

Rome, Feb. 2.—Giovanni Giolitti, the former premier, is making an effort to discredit reports that he has agreed with London to keep Italy neutral. The London Convention, which was published here, denying any such agreement.

DIRECTOR RESIGNS

Professor T. Howard Davies has tendered his resignation as musical director of the Derry Street United Brethren Church. Professor Davies, who is a native of London, has been a member of the church since 1880. His successor has not yet been appointed by the official board of the church.

Petrograd, via London, Feb. 2, 4:54 A. M.—The Government has decided in future to treat the bombardment of unfortified towns as an act of piracy.

May Be Step Toward Another Bridge to Hill

What is believed to be the initial step in another movement toward the construction of a bridge from Allison Hill across the Pennsylvania railroad tracks at Walnut street, was contained in an ordinance introduced in City Council this afternoon by Commissioner H. E. Bowman—providing for the opening of Walnut street from a point 400 feet east of the Cowden street to the western line of Tenth street.

For some months it is understood the city bridge movement has been growing in the East End and it is said that a permanent organization with a view to pushing the project is under way.

The plan, it is said, is to construct a modern concrete structure for from \$250,000 to \$300,000 to span from the Hill to a point at the end of Walnut street and the Pennsy tracks. A bond issue, it is believed, would have to be floated but whether this might be put up to the people or whether it can be provided for without going to the people has not been decided.
