### RELIGIOUS WAR IS NARROWLY AVERTED

Father Zuvich, Croatian Priest, Is Accused of Barring Church Doors Against Serbians

President Wilson's declaration eutrality got a severe blow at Steelon to-day because of the alleged bar-ing of Serbians bearing the flag of heir country from St. Mary's Cro-

ton to-day because of the alleged barring of Serbians bearing the flag of their country from St. Mary's Croatian Catholic Church, by Father Anton Zuvich, rector of the church. This morning more than a dozen Croatian societies with a total membership of several hundred had planned to celebrate the twentleth anniversary of the St. Lawrence Croatian society. The members had invited several hundred Serbians.

A near riot resulted when Father Zuvich, it is said, announced that he would not allow the Serbian flag in the Croatian Church. Hard feelings wery aroused on all sides, the Croatians taking the stand that Father Zuvich's action was unwarranted and that he was trying to raise race prejudice. Joseph Verbos, president of the St. Lawrence society, some time ago told Father Zuvich of the celebration to take place to-day and that the Serbians had been invited to attend. Father Zuvich then stated that he did not approve of their presence, it is alleged.

When asked why he refused to allow

not approve of their presence, it is alleged.

When asked why he refused to allow the Serbians to participate in the celebration and services in the church this morning, he said that his only sreason was that the Serbian flag represented a different religion from that of the Croatians, and that the present war existing between the countries in Europe had nothing to do with it.

K. Pozega said this morning, "The Serbian flag was taken into the same church before and no objections were raised. This is a personal affair of Father Zuvich's. There is no church rule to prevent bringing the flag of another religion into the church and the Father knows it."

Publishes Accusation

Soon after the declaration of war in Europe, John Krasic, editor of the New York Croatian News, came to Steelton, investigated and later published an accusation charging Father Zuvich with advising his people to do the Serbians bodily harm.
