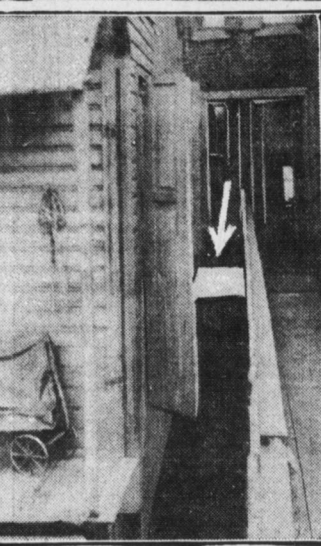
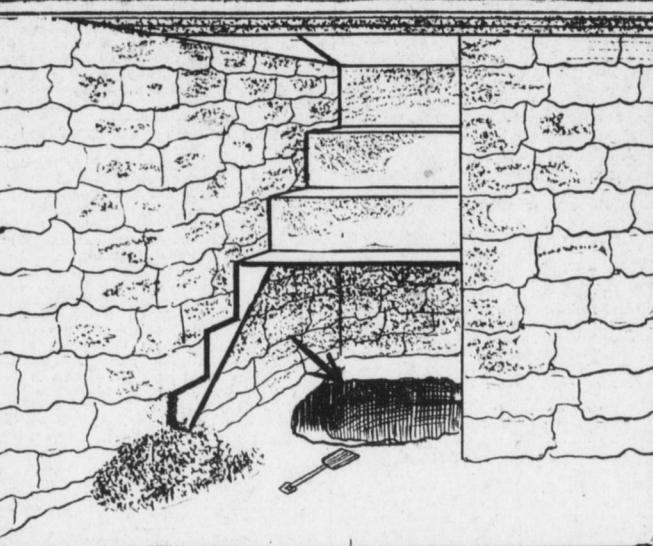
German Family That Lived in Murder House in 1902 Kept Chickens and Geese

ALL TRACE OF PEOPLE LOST

A rusty piece of steel which looks like a razor blade and six or eight chicken feathers were found this morning in the grave in the cellar of the "house of mystery," 133 South Fourteenth street, where Friday the skeleton of a young girl was unearthed by plumbers.

WILL CONTINUE TO STOP FOOD SHIPMENT

London, Feb. 15, 5.05 P. M.—In a statement to the House of Commons to-day Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the Admiralty, intimated that further action would be taken by the allies to prevent the importation of foodstuffs in neutral ships to Germany.

STOUGH TABERNACLE SOLD

A delegation from Reading, this afternoon, purchased the tabernacle from J. E. Dare for \$4,000. The building is now being torn down and will be shipped to Reading for the Stough campaign soon to be opened there. It will be loaded on sixteen flat cars.

NEED FLOUR IN MEXICO

Washington, Feb. 15.—There is no flour in Mexico City, State Department advices say to-day, and bread is being made from cornmeal. Carranza forces there disclaim any intention of evacuating the city. Zapata forces still hold some of the suburbs. General Gutierrez, who fled from the capital, is reported with General Blanco at Valles, 50 miles west of Tampico with 3,000 troops.

BELIEVE AIRSHIPS CROSSED BORDER

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 15.—Residents of Brockville refuse to accept the statements made by young men of Morris town, N. Y., that balloons sent up by them last night were responsible for the report that aeroplanes had crossed the American border at that point and were headed toward Ottawa. The Canadian press to-day received dispatches to the effect that responsible residents claimed they saw the aeroplanes cross the St. Lawrence from the United States last night and that they also saw them homeward bound at 1.30 a. m., to-day.

Reading, Pa., Feb. 15.—The explosion of a gasoline engine on the farm of John Hallman, in Herford, this county, today, resulted in the death of his 15-year-old daughter, Helen Viola Hallman, and of Mr. Hallman. Hallman leaves a widow and six children.

Rome, Feb. 15, 1.35 P. M.—The flood waters in the street around St. Peter's have risen to a height of four feet and eleven inches. Several walls have collapsed, but without serious consequences.
