# WILL START SOON ON **BIG TRACTOR ORDER**

Morton Company to Employ 250 Extra Mechanics on Russian War Machines

Harrisburg will reap much benefit from the \$1,500,000 order for motor trucks received by the Morton Truck and Tractor Company, as all the work on the machines will be done in this city, according to W. S. Morton, general manager of the company.

Part of the plant and machine shops of the Harrisburg Boiler Works at Nineteenth and Derry streets has been leased by the Morton firm for the handling of the extra work on the big order, which will require at least 250 skilled mechanics.

With these extra facilities, Mr. Morton said this morning, about fifty trucks a month will be shipped to Russia. The work will commence as soon as the amount covering the order is deposited in a New York bank by the Russian government. This is expected within a few days.

The contract calls for 200 tractors at \$5.00 cach of the heavy type recently perfected by the company after much experimenting. The machines are gasoline driven, 120-horsepower, four-wheel, worm gear drive, and designed for heavy service over rough foads, and will be provided with special shields of heavy plate for armament in transporting military supplies and provisions.
