J., asking that she be given custody of her offspring. When her husband died two years ago, John Zeidnick took them in and is paid \$5 each per month by the court out of the children's little inheritance of \$450. He is willing to surrender the children to their mother.

Allegheny.—Jacob V. Wagner, a contractor, saved Miss Eliza Baumer from death by extinguishing her burns from her arms. Mr. Wagner was badly burned on the hands.

Lancaster.—Robbers early yesterday caused considerable damage in Councilman H. W. Grimey's liquor store by fire. It is believed that they entered accidentally, started the blaze while searching for money, or set the place on fire in their disappointment at not finding none.

Lancaster.—A herd of cattle on H. S. Ruhl's farm, in Penn township, has been killed by the Federal authorities because of aphthous fever.

Reading.—After the residence of Frank Jones was robbed early yesterday of two gold rings, two overcoats and a suit of clothes, Leo James, a stranger, 26 years old, an inveterate arms of the police who were investigating the robbery. He was locked up.

Dillsburg, Pa., Feb. 24.—Misinterpretation of a telegram caused a great deal of unnecessary anxiety and some expense to Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Shank, of Latmore township, who received the message and Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Trimmer, of South Second street. Several days ago Mr. Shank received word from his daughter, Mrs. John Trimmer, of Illinois, stating that their son had died and that the funeral would be held on Sunday. The Shank family in some way understood the message to mean that they were bringing the body East and would get to Dillsburg on Sunday. So they made arrangements for the funeral to be held in the Chestnut Grove Church on Monday and had the grave dug, and not until relatives of the families gathered at the church and the folks from the city did not arrive, was the mistake discovered.

INJURED PIGEON RETURNS HOME AFTER YEAR'S ABSENCE
