Utilities Commission With Internal Affairs Bureau

A bill abolishing the present Public

A bill abolishing the present Public Service Commission and establishing in its place a commission of five to be a bureau of the Department of Internal Affairs was introduced into the House to-day by Mr. Swartz, Dauphin. The bill transfers all of the powers now held by the commission to the new board.

By the provisions of the bill the Governor is to name the five commissioners, who will appoint all attaches, subject to approval of the Secretary of Internal Affairs. The commissioners are to include a lawyer, a man experienced in railroad management and a railroad employe and will receive \$6,000 each. Provision is made for the cessary officers and clerks. The designated salary list is \$45,000.

Speaking of his bill, Mr. Swartz said it would transfer the commission to the department where it belongs under the Constitution and that the designated salary list is only \$45,000. The present designated salaries, he said, is \$95,000.

"I drafted the bill myself after studying the situation," said he.
