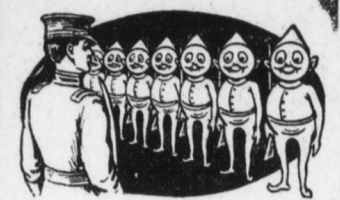

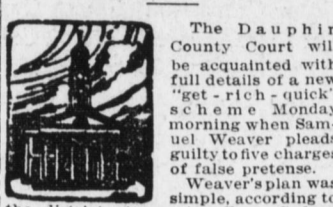

FOOD SITUATION SERIOUS

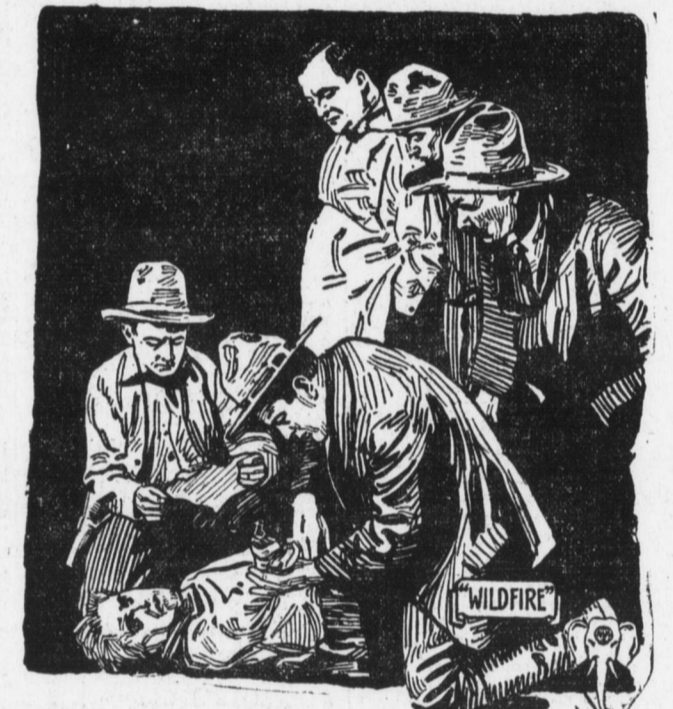
