I relax at the shoulders the instant J am fully covered, then bend head and arms upward and shoot to the surface as quickly as possible. I find it helpful, too, to separate the legs in relaxing, as this brings me up more rapidly by checking the speed of the body. Reginners, however, should be careful not to bend up-ward too suddenly or a badly sprained back may be the consequence.—March Outing.




