

PASTORS WILL CLOSE CONFERENCE YEAR

Special Services Will Be Held and Reports Read by Methodist Ministers

Special services in observance of the closing of the conference year will be held in Methodist churches to-morrow. Pastors will preach special sermons, and in many churches, holy communion and baptism will be observed.

Resolutions asking that the pastors of the seven Methodist churches be returned have been passed by the various congregations and will be presented at the conference which convenes on March 17, at Shamokin.

The various pastors will give reports for the church work of the year. At Stevens Memorial, the Rev. Clayton Albert Smucker, pastor for more than two years, will speak on "The Recruiting Department of the Church," in the morning and on "The Enemies of Harrisburg Women," in the evening. The Rev. J. D. W. Deavor, pastor of the Epworth church for one year, will speak on "Christ's Attitude Toward Those Who Hesitate to Accept Him," in the evening. Communion will be celebrated in the morning.

Interesting Themes
At St. Paul's church, the Rev. Robert W. Runyan, pastor, will preach on "What Is Our Goal?" The Rev. A. S. Williams, pastor of the Curtin Heights church, will preach on "Paul's Gospel," and "A Great Denomination and a Great Church." Communion will be observed in the morning at the Ridge Avenue church, and the Rev. John H. Daugherty will preach on "Why Christ Receives Sinners," in the evening. "The Christian Crowned," and "Challenge to Universal Gratitude," are the subjects of the sermons of the Rev. Dr. John D. Fox, pastor of Grace Church.

The Rev. B. H. Hart, pastor of the Fifth Street church, will hold a special hymn service to-morrow evening. The hymns written by Fanny Crosby will be used exclusively, and after each one is sung, the pastor will give a brief history of the hymn and the circumstances concerning its writing.

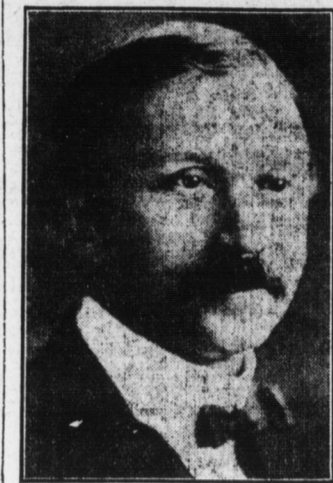

Will Hold Three Simultaneous Demonstrations in Widely Separated Churches

Final arrangements for the three gigantic mass meetings to be held on Allison Hill, in the central district and in the west end of the city, will be completed within the next few days.
