Superintendent W. B. McCaleb and other Philadelphia Division officials will witness the turning on of the electric current between Bryn Mawr and Philadelphia on Thursday.

The event was scheduled for to-day at 12:01 p. m. but it is the desire to have all cars ready, and the time was changed until Thursday.

The event, according to officials, is to be of great importance. Nearly 1,000 men—railroad officials, construction engineers, workmen and laborers—who have been working on the job, will be on hand, and it will be looked upon with interest by hundreds of men interested in electrical science in all parts of the country.
