In the world's orchestra Maud Powell is one of the first violins simply because she is so much more than a violinist. When a famous European musician cried out in amazement, "You play like a man!" he missed the fact that in her womanhood was the source, not the limitation, of her art. She is interested in politics and peace of art, of American music and greatness of woman.

She loathes militancy, but is not opposed to woman suffrage, although having no particular desire to vote, yet believes the withholding of it seems unfair.

Maud Powell disclaims artistic supremacy for her sex and says: "There are few women that equal the greatest men in the field of art. They have not interested, nor thrown their whole natures into artistic forms of expression. There is something of the man, too, in the greatest women, as there is in the woman in the greatest man. You find that in the tenderness that is in Ysaye's playing at times."
